A Message from Thack

Once a do-it-yourselfer went into a hardware store and asked about a new saw for cutting firewood. The sales clerk took a chain saw from the shelf and told him it was the newest model, with the latest technology, guaranteed to cut ten cords of wood a day. The customer thought that sounded great, so he bought it on the spot.

The next day the customer returned, looking somewhat exhausted. "Something must be wrong with the saw," he complained. "I worked as hard as I could and only managed to cut five cords of firewood. I used to cut seven with my old saw."

Confused, the sales clerk said, "Here, let me try it out back on some wood we keep there." They went to the woodpile, the salesman pulled the starter cord, and as the motor went *Proooooom*, the customer jumped back and shouted, "What's that noise?"

While this story could be used as a great Auburn/Alabama joke, it does have a serious application. The customer trying to saw wood without the power of the saw to help him is very much like the believer who attempts to live the Christian life without the daily empowerment of the Holy Spirit. That's why it is important to remember that the Holy Spirit is God's gift to the Church.

This Sunday is the feast day of Pentecost. The term "Pentecost" means "fiftieth day." The term is used in the New Testament to refer to the coming of the Holy Spirit on the Day of Pentecost (Acts 2:1), shortly after Jesus' death, resurrection, and ascension. It emphasizes that the church is understood as the body of Christ which is drawn together and given life by the Holy Spirit. Hence, we regard Pentecost as the birthday of the church.

The coming of the Holy Spirit on that first day of Pentecost was not a once and for all event, but the beginning of the Spirit's permanent presence in the Church. Wherever there are hearts open to receive the Spirit, the Spirit of God is poured out, inspiring people to undertake their mission as Christ's representatives. By allowing our hearts to be led by the Spirit, we can become changed people because the Spirit will disturb our complacency, uproot our mediocrity, and make way for fresh growth. Empowered by the Spirit, we will be equipped and enabled to live intentional lives of service.

Do you need spiritual rejuvenation? Do you feel ill equipped to do the work that God calls us to do? If so, then when we gather together this Sunday to celebrate the birthday of the church, let's open our hearts and minds to receive the transforming power of the Holy Spirit.

Parish Nurse News

Summer is here! For most of us, that means a lot more time in the sun. And for ALL of us, that time can put our health at risk if we don't protect our skin.

May is National Melanoma / Skin Cancer Detection and Prevention Month sponsored by the American Academy of Dermatology. This year's slogan is "Check Your Partner. Check Yourself." This campaign is aimed at women and encourages them to check both themselves and their spouses or partners for signs of skin cancer. Research has shown that women are nine times more likely than men to notice melanoma on others, which means women are in a unique position to help save lives from skin cancer.

So what IS skin cancer? Skin cancer is an abnormal growth of skin cells that develops most often on areas of the skin exposed to the sun's rays. Skin cancer affects people of all colors and races, although people with fair skin who sunburn easily have a higher risk. There are several forms of skin cancer with melanoma being the deadliest form. However, if detected early, it is highly treatable. The five-year survival rate for melanoma when detected and treated in its early stages is 98%!

Here are the ABCDEs of melanoma:

- A = asymmetry: One half is unlike the other half.
- B = border: There is an irregular, scalloped or poorly defined border.
- C = color: Its color is varied from one area to another; has shades of tan, brown, black or is sometimes white, red or bluish-tinged.
- D = diameter: Melanomas are usually greater than 6mm (the size of a pencil eraser) when diagnosed but they can be smaller.
- E = evolving: A mole or skin lesion that looks different from the rest or is changing in size, shape or color.

If you notice a spot that looks different or is changing, you should make an appointment with a dermatologist.

Now for the good news...we can protect ourselves! Sun exposure is the most preventable risk factor for all skin cancers, including melanoma. You can have fun in the sun and still decrease your risk of skin cancer.

Here are the most important tips:

- Seek shade between 10am and 2pm when the sun's rays are the strongest. **If your shadow is shorter than you, seek shade**
- Wear protective clothing such as wide brimmed hats, UV protective shirts, and sunglasses.
- Generously apply sunscreen with an SPF of 30 or higher to all exposed skin. Use a sunscreen that is BROAD-SPECTRUM (will block ultraviolet A and B rays) and WATER-RESISTANT. Reapply every two hours, even on cloudy days.
- Use caution near water, snow, and sand as they reflect the damaging ultraviolet rays of the sun.
- Get vitamin D safely through a healthy diet and / or supplements versus via the sun.
- Avoid tanning beds
- Talk to your children (especially teens) about the risks of skin cancer and encourage the habit of sunscreen use while discouraging sunbathing.

With a little planning and protection, we can all have a fun summer that still leaves our skin safe. If you have questions or concerns about skin cancers or a particular skin lesion, please contact one of the Parish Nurses or your healthcare provider.

PREVENT Skin Cancer: Protect Yourself From the Sun

Sun exposure is the most preventable risk factor for all skin cancers, including melanoma. You can have fun in the sun and decrease your risk of skin cancer.

Here's how to protect yourself from the sun:

- **Seek shade** when appropriate, remembering that the sun's rays are strongest between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. If your shadow is shorter than you are, seek shade.
- **Wear protective clothing**, such as a long-sleeved shirt, pants, a wide-brimmed hat and sunglasses, when possible.
- **Generously apply a broad-spectrum, water-resistant sunscreen** with a Sun Protection Factor (SPF) of 30 or higher to all exposed skin. Broad-spectrum provides protection from both ultraviolet A (UVA) and ultraviolet B (UVB) rays. Re-apply approximately every two hours, even on cloudy days, and after swimming or sweating.
- **Use extra caution near water, snow, and sand** as they reflect the damaging rays of the sun which can increase your chance of skin cancer.
- **Get vitamin D safely** through a healthy diet that may include vitamin supplements. Don't seek the sun.
- **Avoid tanning beds.** Ultraviolet light from the sun and tanning beds can cause skin cancer and wrinkling. If you want to look like you've been in the sun, consider using a sunless self-tanning product, but continue to use sunscreen with it.



If you find any spots on your skin that are different from others or are changing, itching, or bleeding, make an appointment to see a board-certified dermatologist.

Follow these instructions regularly for a thorough skin exam: **1.** Learn what to look for. **2.** Examine your skin. **3.** Record your spots and remember if you notice any change, contact your dermatologist to make an appointment. If you don't have one, visit aad.org to find one in your area.

1 The ABCDEs of Melanoma

What to Look for:

Melanoma is the deadliest form of skin cancer. However, when detected early, melanoma can be effectively treated. You can identify the warning signs of melanoma by looking for the following:



One half unlike the other half.



Irregular, scalloped or poorly defined border.



Varied from one area to another; shades of tan and brown, black, sometimes white, red or blue.



While melanomas are usually greater than 6mm (the end of a pencil eraser) when diagnosed, they can be smaller. See ruler below for a guide.



A mole on skin looks that looks different from the rest or is changing in size, shape or color.

2 Skin Cancer Self-Examination

How to Check Your Spots:

Checking your skin means taking note of all the spots on your body, from moles to freckles to age spots. Skin cancer can develop anywhere on the skin and is one of the few cancers you can usually see on your skin. Ask someone for help when checking your skin, especially in hard to see places.



Examine body front and back in mirror, especially legs.



Bend elbows, look carefully at forearms, back of upper arms, and palms.



Look at feet, spaces between toes and soles.



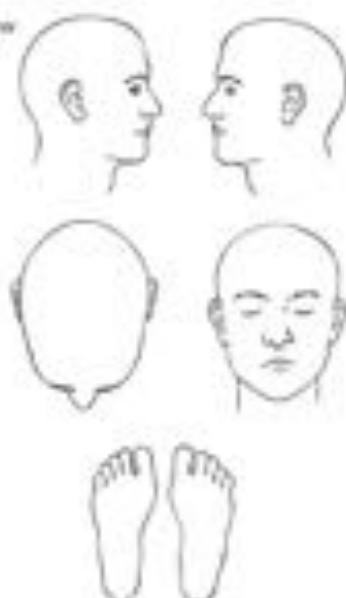
Examine back of neck and scalp with a hand mirror. Part hair and lift.



Finally, check back and buttocks with a hand mirror.

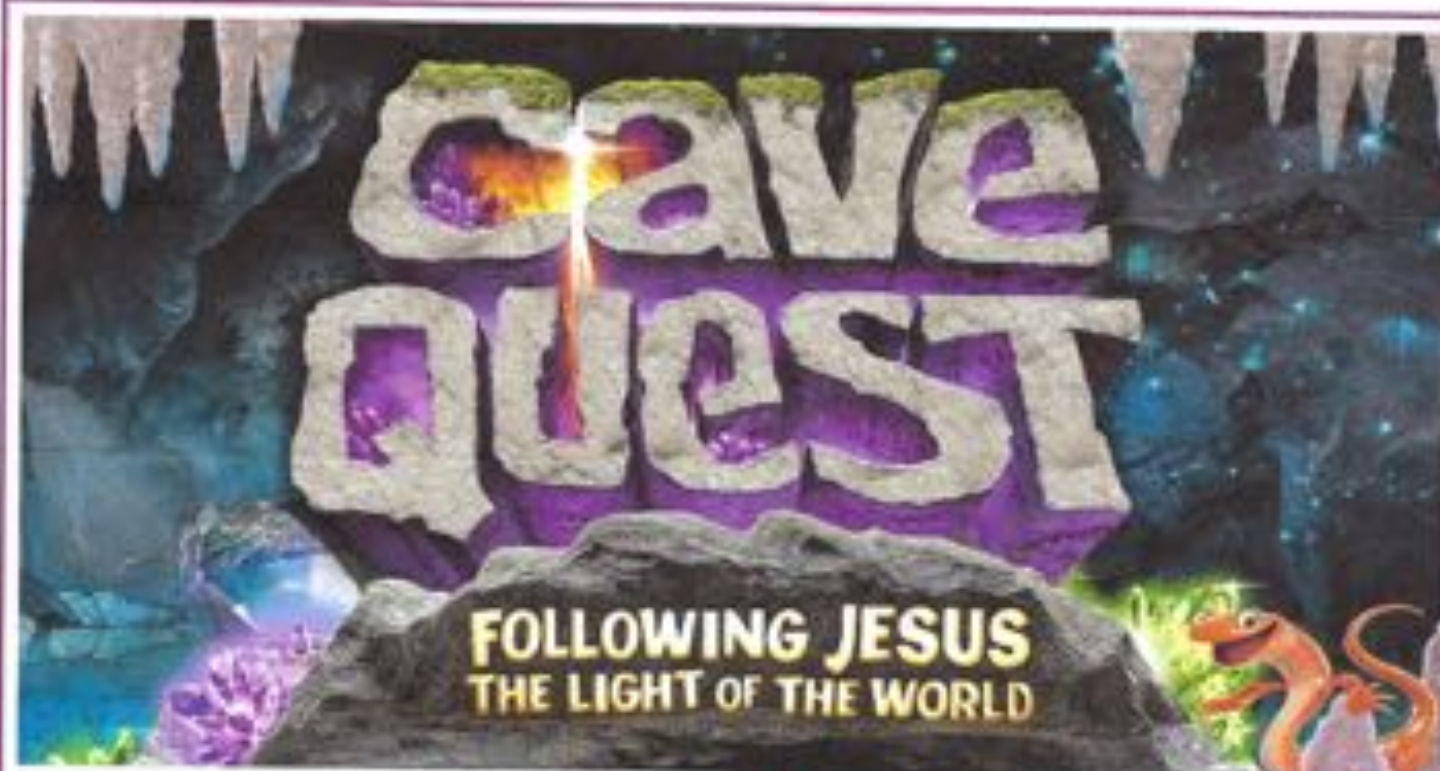
