A Message from Thack

We have two tropical storms brewing. One is in the Gulf and one in the Caribbean near Venezuela heading toward the Gulf. Our hurricane season is starting out with a bang! We have been blessed to have dodged the bullet for over ten years now since we last experienced a major storm. However, as we all know here in hurricane country, it's not a matter of "if" we will experience another storm, it is a matter of "when" we will experience another storm. The Gulf, at times so beautiful and tranquil, can also become turbulent and violent without much warning.

The same can be said of the Sea of Galilee. The Sea of Galilee is in the northern part of Israel. Though called a "sea," it is actually a lake. Only thirteen miles in length, seven and one-half miles at its widest point, surrounded by hills, including the Golan Heights, it was the chief source of revenue for its fishermen, and a place of pleasure and beauty for those who lived around its shores. Most of Jesus' ministry occurred around this body of water. He called his disciples from this area.

The Sea of Galilee could also be a place for solitude and repose. In the fourth chapter of the Gospel of Mark, Jesus had already developed a strong following and the demands of ministry were exhausting. So, he took a boat and with some of his disciples drifted off for a period of rest. However, like the unpredictable summer weather here, it wasn't long before their day of leisure was disrupted by a sudden violent storm. This was not unusual. The Sea of Galilee is 680 feet below sea level, surrounded by hills that send the cool air from the heights of Mt. Hermon hurtling through their ravines that serve as giant wind tunnels to collide with the warm, moist air flowing east from the Mediterranean Sea. The result can produce a very dramatic storm in only a matter of minutes. In that sudden storm, Jesus did an astounding thing, and in that we learn some things we need to remember in light the storms of life we sometimes have to navigate through.

First of all, we are reminded that although the Son of God is on the boat, it is no guarantee against a sudden storm (Mark 4:37). It has been the mistaken notion of many that if a person is a faithful follower of Jesus, he or she is protected from the troubles of life. Their children will be successful, sickness will never come their way, their financial ventures will always succeed, and disappointment will never knock at their door. A quick look at some of the men and women from Scripture who knew and served God will reveal the fallacy of this belief. Joseph went to prison. Job lost everything but his life. Jeremiah was put in prison. Paul had an affliction that plagued him all his life. With one exception, all of the original disciples were martyred for their faith. No, Jesus never said following him would protect his followers from disaster. However, he did promise, "I am with you always." (Matt. 28:20).

Second, it may appear that these sudden storms of life threaten our sense of God's nearness and care and that God isn't doing anything. (Mark 4:38). These experienced, veteran fishermen were thoroughly frightened. Their lives were on the line, yet Jesus appeared to be sleeping through the situation. In life, things come at us that we cannot control. Some things come through the actions of other people, and some things in life are never explained. Sometimes God seems to be silent when we long for an encouraging word. In these moments of despair, we, like the disciples, may protest the seeming inaction of Jesus when he appears to be asleep at the wheel of our lives

In these times, we should remember that while Jesus did not hear the howling storm, he heard his disciples' cries. Upon hearing their pleas of distress, Jesus demonstrated he was in control. Jesus, with a word, rebuked the wind and waves and the storm dissipated. When he did, the disciples were reminded that Jesus is in control when everything else seems to be totally out of control. That boat could not sink because God's plan for the world was on it.

The Rev. David Watson was an Anglican Priest and evangelist. His last curacy was as vicar St. Michael's Church in York, England. Watson was a very popular priest and by the early 1980's, his dynamic preaching drew large crowds to his services. However, in the prime of his life, Watson was diagnosed with cancer. The people prayed, and he fought it. But, in the end, it ravaged his body and he died.

The following Sunday, a cherished friend of Watson's was asked to preach and celebrate the Eucharist at St. Michael's. When he stood to speak, emotion overcame him as he thought of his recently deceased friend. He wept, as did many of the grief-stricken congregation. Then his friend thought about a phrase that David often used. Sometimes, even in the middle of a sermon, Watson would shout, "Our Lord reigns!" Quietly, but strong enough to be heard, his friend said, "Our Lord reigns!" Another picked it up. Then another joined them. Soon the packed nave was filled with hundreds of voices, chanting together on their feet, "Our Lord reigns!" Applause and cheering broke out. Depression quickly gave way to celebration. When you feel yourself in the middle of one of life's storms, trust that you are never alone and that God hears your cries of distress and desperation. With a word, he can calm your fears and bring you peace. Just know he is with you always and no matter what, our Lord reigns!

Quite a few of you have been to Kanuga. You all hear it mentioned quite often in church or in the <u>Tentmaker</u>. Do you all know what it is?

It is officially Kanuga Conference, Retreat and Camp Center, located near Hendersonville, NC. It was purchased in 1928 by the dioceses of the Carolinas. On 1400 acres, with little Lake Kanuga, a large Inn and cottages for smaller groups, it serves 25,000 guests a year from all 50 states and around the world.

In addition to conferences and retreats, there is a co-ed camp and outreach Camp Bob, a school year Mountain Trail Outdoor Camp, special offerings known as "guest weeks" during the summer and at special times like Thanksgiving and Christmas. Families like the Nicholsons have been there many times. Terri McMillan and Elizabeth Faust were there last week for conferences. Clay and Anita Rankin will be there this coming weekend for the annual Renewal Conference. Several of us have been in the August retreat in liturgical arts, for which our own Sally Boom has been a pillar.

Two weeks ago Rebecca and Thack, Phyllis Bruce, Janice Miles and I were there for the annual Province IV Altar Guild Conference. Phyllis is vice president on its board. Thack and I were leading this year's focus on worship and music, with some history of church music, Anglican contributions specially to church music, a walk through Holy Week at St. Paul's, a look at the Book of Occasional Services, Eucharists in the lovely, rustic Chapel of the Transfiguration, Taize Prayer on the covered 3rd floor porch of the Inn with frogs joining in the singing [everyone attending was asked to bring candles], lots of good food, hours of social time and a make-your-own Sundae party on the Rocking Chair Porch of the Inn. 
The altar guild members are keen to participate, they love to sing, and their enthusiasm was a great lift for me, as things have been like a roller coaster ride for us Andersons for a while.



Parish Nurse News

As you read this sentence, take a minute to look around your environment - wherever you are: your house, your workplace, your car – how safe is your current environment? Are you aware of potential dangers where you are this very minute? According to *Injury Facts 2016*, published by the National Safety Council, over 136,000 people died in 2014 from unintentional injury-related deaths. That is over 136,000 times in one year that someone's ordinary day turned tragic. And while these statistics are several years old, the preliminary data shows that subsequent years will be no better. The National Safety Council has designated June as National Safety Month in an effort to raise awareness about hazards related to workplace, home, and recreational activities and to encourage proper safety precautions.

Often these tragedies happen when least expected – during a vacation, driving across town, or just doing chores at home. Here are the top causes (in order) of unintentional injury related death in our homes and communities across the country:

- 1. Poisoning: poisoning became the leading cause of unintentional- injury related deaths for all ages combined over motor vehicle crashes in 2011 and has remained number one since. Prescription drug overdoses specifically opioids is by far the leading cause. Other dangers include radon gas, carbon monoxide, lead poisoning, button batteries, and household products like cleaners and pesticides. Look critically around your home and workplace for possible risks of poisoning. Make sure you take medications as prescribed and never take medications that are not prescribed specifically for you.
- 2. Motor Vehicle Crashes: the second leading cause of unintentional injury-related deaths overall. Impaired driving, distracted driving (texting and cell phone use), speeding and inexperience are the major contributors. Remember that seat belts save lives that's why 49 out of 50 states have seat belt laws. Additionally, proper child restraints are critical to decreasing the risk to our most precious cargo. All police and fire departments have someone who can evaluate your child's car seat to make sure it is safe and installed correctly. Consider enrolling your teenage driver in a Safe Driving Course. And NEVER drive under the influence alcohol is involved in one-third of all traffic fatalities in the U.S. that's about 10,000 deaths per year.
- 3. Falls: while this is the 3rd leading cause of unintentional-injury-related deaths for all age groups, it is the top cause for those over age 70. Most falls are preventable and aging, itself, doesn't cause falls. Some of the underlying causes of older-adult falls, such as muscle weakness, medications that cause dizziness, improper footwear, impaired vision, slick floors, poor lighting, loose rugs, clutter and uneven surfaces can be improved when properly addressed.
- 4. Choking and suffocation: choking on food or other objects is the primary cause. Take the time to learn basic CPR which includes how to help a choking victim you never know when you might be in the right place at the right time to save a life. To prevent choking in children, keep small objects out of the reach of children, cut food into small pieces, and don't let them have hard candy.
- 5. Drowning: not including boating accidents, about 10 people die from drowning every day. It is the 1st leading cause of unintentional-injury related death for children ages 1 to 4 most commonly from pools and bathtubs. For adults, always swim with a buddy and never swim if you have been drinking alcohol. For children, vigilance is key never leave your child unattended around water and opt for snug fitting lifejackets over floaties.

- 6. Fires and burns: most often, house fires resulting in deaths occur at night. A working smoke alarm can decrease your risk of death from a fire by 55%. Take the time to make sure your smoke alarms are functioning properly. If you have small children, practice fire drills and make sure your children know what to do if the fire alarm goes off. Interestingly, all major causes of home structure fires (smoking, heaters, electrical) have steadily declined over the last decade except one. Candle-related fires are up 125%. Consider using flameless wax warmers instead of candles.
- 7. Natural and Environmental incidents: weather related disasters claim hundreds of lives every year. Make sure you have a family disaster plan as well as emergency kits at home and in your car. Have an evacuation plan should the need arise. Most importantly, have an emergency radio so that you can stay informed.

As we start our summer season, take a few minutes to critically evaluate your home and work environments for injury risks. Be intentional about your safety, as well as that of your family. Help your children develop good safety habits. Preventative safety measures, along with some good common sense, can tremendously decrease your risk from unintentional injury.
